Breast Cancer Screening for Hispanic Veterans



Get Screened for Breast Cancer

VA recommends routine screenings for breast cancer to improve disease outcomes. The earlier the cancer is detected, the more successful the cancer treatment can be, potentially reducing the need for extensive treatments such as chemotherapy.

Hispanics are the largest ethnic minority in the United States. There are currently more than 1.4 million Hispanic Veterans living in the United States and Hispanics represent 7% of the total Veteran population. Veteran women are more racially and ethnically diverse than Veteran men, and the population of women Veterans is expected to grow to almost 18% by 2040.

The good news is that almost three-quarters of Hispanic Veterans who are eligible for VA health care receive their care through VA and do so regularly and more frequently than the overall Veteran population. VA wants to deliver all Hispanic Veterans the health care and benefits they deserve and have earned.

Key Facts

- There are approximately 213,000 Hispanic women Veterans in the United States in 2023.
- Breast cancer is the most common cancer (and the leading cause of cancer death) among Hispanic women.
- Hispanic women tend to be diagnosed with more advanced breast cancers than white women.

Who Should Get Screened?

- Women aged 40-74 should get screened every other year starting at age 40 to reduce their risk of dying from breast cancer.
- Women Veterans will have the option to screen annually if they would like to do so.
- Women 75 or older, should talk with their provider before making a decision to be screened. Requests to be screened beyond age 75 will be honored following a discussion about the risks and benefits of screening.
